Mission

National Wildlife Federation (NWF) is the United States' largest private, nonprofit conservation education and advocacy organization, with over four million members and supporters, and 47 state and territorial affiliated organizations. The NWF strives to remain "A national network of like-minded state and territorial groups, seeking balanced, common-sense solutions to environmental problems that work for wildlife and people." Indeed, re-establishing longleaf pine ecosystems will benefit all Americans by improving climate resilience, economic opportunity, and ecosystem vitality. NWF has initiated an ambitious forestry program focused on Longleaf pine restoration on private lands in Southeast United States. A major component of the program targets African American and other minority and small landowners. NWF also believe that longleaf pine ecosystem restoration should be the centerpiece of forest-based climate adaptation and carbon sequestration efforts in the region

Contributions

The National Wildlife Federation will:

- Contibute in achieving the restoration and management goals in the Range-wide Conservation Plan for Longleaf Pine (America's Longleaf Restoration Initiative, March 2010)
- Engage with private landowners and a range of resource providers (federal agencies, state

 longleaf pine restoration
